Lee A. Belden, age 94, passed away peacefully after a brief illness on May 24, 2025.

Sadly, Lois passed away in December, 2024, succumbing to complications from a stroke. With waning mobility and health, and a heavy heart, Lee elected to move to Mackenzie Place in April of this year.

Lee was preceded in death by Lois, his parents, and brothers Paul and Clifford Belden. He is survived by his 3 step children: Steven Holme (Kirby Harth) of Palm Springs, CA, Dr. Robert Holme (Gina) of Tifton, GA, and Dr. Lori Ahrens (Kurt) of Mount Vernon, WA, as well as two nieces.

Lee was a dedicated and loving husband, stepfather, and uncle. He was kind and generous, and he will be missed by the many wonderful friends and neighbors who knew him and helped to make Colorado home.
